Esther Cornelius

Founder, Lutheran Schools for Blind, Deaf & Mentally Challenged Kids, India

Mrs. Esther Cornelius was born on July 25th, 1927 and raised in Madurai. In the late 1940s, she studied at the American College where she regularly accompanied her Father on his social work visits to the Beggar's home in Madurai and did her field work with the mentally challenged in Chennai. In 1954 Esther married Rev. N.J. Cornelius and moved to Ambur, where while working as a high school teacher, she introduced the society in this area to the idea that the disabled have to be taken care of and were not to be neglected. She was the first person ever to do so.

In 1971 Mrs. Cornelius's life took a tragic turn when her husband suffered a heart attack, leaving her widowed with 9 children. She was advised to take up a teaching job offer abroad, where she could escape the terrible circumstances of being a widow with children in India. However, her calling to serve the underprivileged was stronger and instead she decided to resign her teaching job and complete her training for the blind, thus starting her mission for the disabled and underprivileged.

With a solid foundation in teaching and education (Bachelor of Science and Education) Mrs Cornelius went on to become the founder of various institutions including:

"Deaf School in Ambur"- (India 1970), "The Blind School in Bargur"- (India 1972), "School for Mentally Retarded Children"- (Pernambet, India 1974), "The School for Polio Affected Children"- (KGF,India 1975), "School for Triple Handicapped Children" - (Mumbai, India 1983), "Tabitha Girls Boarding" - (Ambur 1985) management of the redevelopment Program, "Home for Physically Handicapped Children" - (Krishnagiri, India 1989), "Supporter of the Training Centre for Disabled Adults" - (Vaniyambadi India1990), "Compassion Day Care Centre" -(Vellore /KGF/ Vaniyambadi India 1993) orphans, semi orphans and poor children are given eduation, food and shelter, "Supporter of the Vocational Training Centre Jovana Home for Blind Women" - (Chennai India 1998), "Helping unwed mothers, saving them from suicide, and sending them to the rehabilitation centers.

Since 2005 she has been striving to promote education and medical care for the Hill tribes in the interior part of Yelagari and is currently looking for funding and donor agencies to start "Cross Mercy Bethania Home for homeless, underprivileged Children in K.G.F India.

Mrs. Cornelius turned her tragedies and losses into dedication for the less fortunate and her attitude of giving without expecting anything in return has been a great inspiration to others. She is a truly remarkable woman, who has dedicated her life to serving the disabled, blind, deaf and underprivileged people stricken with poverty in South India, making a true change in the lives of many people. As a pioneer in this field, Esther was knocking at many doors, appealing, begging, arguing and fighting to prove that even the poorest among the poor have a right to live and have food, shelter and an education.

Mrs. Cornelius at 91 is still active doing humanitarian, charity works.



Doug Geed
Anchor/Reporter, News 12 Long Island

An award winning journalist, a dedicated family man, and a devout man of faith, Doug Geed wears many hats and each of them with great pride.

One of the most recognizable faces and trusted people in television news, Doug is an original member of the News 12 Long Island team when it became the first 24-hour, local television news station in the country in 1986. His 37 year news career has garnered him numerous awards, including 10 Emmy Awards. In 2004, he was named Long Island Journalist of the Year by the Society of Professional Journalists. And, he was inducted as part of the inaugural class into the Long Island Journalism Hall of Fame in 2014. Most recently, Doug was named one of the 50 Most Influential People on Long Island by City & State Magazine, a national publication dedicated to covering government, politics and the media.

Although he has been hailed as one of the best "news men" in the business, one of his greatest journalistic pleasures is the show he created, hosts and produces, the Emmy Award winning "East End Show". Now in its 21st season, it is one of the longest running shows on TV.



These funds have supported work among many Chinese, Korean, Bengali, Liberian, Pakistani, and others in our midst in New York; feeding people in Liberia during the Ebola crisis; social ministry efforts in Far Rockaway after Superstorm Sandy and many more . . .

The "Witness in the Public Square" honors those who have provided an exemplary witness in bringing Christian values to the public square through word and deed. Honorees can come from all walks of life: Edwin Meese, 75th US Attorney General; "Coalition of the Willing", people involved in Superstorm Sandy Response; Gerard Arpey, CEO of the parent company of American Airlines; Gloria Edwards, LCMS & LIRS & LWR Board of Director member; Kathy Funfgeld, Atlantic District Lay Deacon, support of her church and the Atlantic District; among many others.

After college his family moved to New Hyde Park where he took a break from church but, continued his inner search for his meaning of Christ and the growth of his own faith journey. After marriage, he and his family joined Ascension Lutheran Church in Deer Park for a few years before finding St. Luke. Feeling a sense of "Christian home", Doug and his family joined the church and has worshipped at St. Luke for the past 21 years.

His involvement has included a member of the Youth Minister Search Committee, the Inaugural Rally Day Committee, the Pastoral Search Committee, lay reader, communion assistant, usher, and most recently as President of St. Luke's Church Council.

Doug grew up in Syosset, Long Island, New York. He received a Bachelor of Journalism Degree from the University of Missouri at Columbia in 1980. He was also one of the founding adjunct professors for the University of Stony Brook's Communications School.

Doug has been happily married to his wife Christine for 33 years and has three children, who are the joy of his life, son Kyle, and his two daughters, Kendall and Kierin. A devoted father, he coached little league in Half Hollow Hills for both Kyle and Kierin's teams and supported Kendall on the lacrosse field. Their daughter, Elsa Supley, (Liz's mom) saw her seven children all baptized and confirmed at Immanuel. Elsa was a very active member at Immanuel until her passing in 2005. Liz married Victor Mazzotti in 1982 at Immanuel. They have two married sons (Victor and Danielle, Philip and Nicole), and two grand daughters, Ella and Sophia. Their youngest grand daughter, Sophia, was baptized at Immanuel in December. She feels very blessed to have six generations as part of Immanuel's history.

It is from that history where Liz learned that the love and grace of Jesus Christ is for the community as a whole and her church is the starting point for impacting people's lives in real and practical ways. Liz has dedicated her service at Immanuel towards this goal. She has served as the leader of Immanuel's outreach ministry, Kingdom Servants. Kingdom Servant's was combined in 2012 with the idea of joining Social Ministry and Evangelism. Through out many years, Liz lead dinners at Ronald McDonald House and the Damien Center: serving dinners at the Schenectady City Mission, collections for the Ronald McDonald, City Mission, SAFE, Inc., back to school supplies for City Schools, Milk & Honey program for church members and friends, and her annual Adopt-A-Family & Those In Need program at Christmas. This September, Immanuel along with Niskayuna Schools, is kicking off the NISKY NOW food program to support children and families specifically in the local school district. "Engaging the World with the Gospel of Hope"

The Great Commission tells us to, "Go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing and teaching." The Atlantic District of the LCMS seeks to fulfill this command by reaching out into the neighborhoods around us, because "all nations" reside there. The mission and history of the Atlantic District has been one of welcoming and embracing each wave of immigrants and newcomers from around the world by boat, plane or foot.

The Atlantic District seeks to reach out with the Gospel of Jesus Christ in the midst of one of the most densely populated, ethnically diverse areas of the country. The Atlantic District is the eastern half of New York State including the Adirondacks, Capital Region, Hudson Valley, Westchester County, the five boroughs of New York City, Nassau and Suffolk counties of Long Island.

There are nearly 100 churches, 34 schools, including 4 high schools and Concordia College – NY, and a number of other social service ministries. The Gospel is proclaimed in at least 12 languages including:

American Sign Language, Bangla, Cantonese, English, French, Hindi, Japanese, Korean, Mandarin, Punjabi, Spanish, Tamil, and Urdu. There are also more than 50 different cultures represented in our congregations from 5 continents around the world like: African American, Caribbean, Central American, Dominican, Ghanaian, Guyana, Jamaica, Liberian, Malagasy, Tobago, Trinidad ...

There are 11 missionaries to various cultural groups directly supported by funds from the Atlantic District Mission Society. These missionaries and our parishes baptize adults, youth and babies from no faith and other faiths like Islam, Buddhism, Hinduism, and others. Together we seek to serve those around us with the gospel in word and deed. Christ sends us out from His altar, pulpit and font, to serve the community and neighborhoods around us with the love and forgiveness that Christ has given us.

Thousands of people come to know the love of Jesus through the service of our Lutheran Schools and Social Ministries like: Concordia College — NY: Martin Luther

High School; Long Island Lutheran High School; Lutheran Counseling Center; Lutheran Friends for the Deaf; Lutheran Services NY Alliance: Lutheran Social Services NY; Our Savior High School, Centereach; Our Saviour High School, The Bronx: The Lutheran Care Network: The Wartburg and many many others.

The harvest is truly plentiful, but the laborers are few. As we look toward the future, the Atlantic District recognizes that times are changing and yet the message remains the same. The same Jesus, who died for the sins of the world, died for the sins of the people

today. As we strive to serve the needs today, we look at redeveloping properties to provide: affordable housing; partnerships with schools; senior housing: and community meeting areas. These are opportunities to share the hope of Jesus Christ into the lives of people.

The Atlantic District seeks to encourage, equip and empower all of our servants: ordained, commissioned and lay by raising up leaders from all the communities in our midst so they may share the Hope of Jesus Christ.



Mission Focus:

New York City has the greatest concentration of people from Haiti in the USA. The official numbers between Brooklyn and Queens are about 156,000, however the actual number is estimated to be 400,000.

Pastor Jean Gardy Cenat, a native of Haiti has brought together a worshipping community of Hatian immigrants. They have partnered with St. Matthew Lutheran Church in Canarsie and Pastor Christoph Schulze. Under the direction of Pastor Cenat and the power of the Holy Spirit a church continues to grow among the Haitian people. Pastor Cenat Engages the World with the Gospel of Hope as he preaches and teaches in French, while holding down a full time job to take care of his family.

This mission started with a pastor and a desire to share Jesus with the people of his country. People coming to the hope we have in Jesus, supported by you.
