28 29 30 31	Whereas, the pastors being developed, ordained, and called to the Atlantic District through these programs—and others for Commissioned workers—remain a primary source of hope for the Lutheran Christian future in Eastern New York State; Therefore, be it

#### Concordia College New York

- Whereas, Concordia College New York was founded in 1881 in what was the LCMS 5 Eastern District and is now the LCMS Atlantic District when The Evangelical Lutheran Church and School of St. Matthew in Manhattan 6 7 established a "Sexta" and "Quinta" at St. Matthew Academy, thereby 8 beginning what would be called the "New York Progymnasium;" and
- Whereas, Concordia College (referred to as the "Progymnasium," "Concordia Progymnasium," and "Concordia Lutheran Collegiate Institute" before being known universally as "Concordia College") relocated to the Hamlet 11 12 of Hawthorne, New York on Buttermilk Hill before moving to its current 13 location in the Village of Bronxville, New York; and
- Whereas, Concordia College New York not only has served the east coast of the 14 15 United States but people throughout the nation and around the world by 16 giving all people access to quality Christian education and rigorous 17 opportunities to pursue studies in the liberal arts; and
- Whereas, Concordia College has been a place for Lutherans and for others to 18 19 gather for conventions, meetings, concerts, art events, sports events, 20 and other activities for over a century; and
- 21 Whereas, There is a time for all endeavors of man, which blossom one day and wither the next like the flowers of the field, but the Word of the Lord 22 23 and His work of salvation endure forever (Ecclesiastes 3; Isaiah 40; 24 James 1); and,
- Whereas, Concordia College ceased all academic operations at the end of the 25 2020-2021 academic year; and 26
- 27 Whereas, the closure of Concordia College has left an enormous hole in the 28 hearts of alumni, faculty, staff, friends, and the Atlantic District; 29 therefore be it
- 30 Resolved, That we, the Atlantic District in Convention recognize, remember, 31 and give thanks to God for the good and godly work of the many alumni, faculty, and staff throughout the history of Concordia in the training 32 33 and instruction of God's Word and Christian life; and be it further
- 34 Resolved, That we recognize, remember, and give thanks to God for the good and 35 godly work of the many friends of Concordia which they have done and will continue to do in our congregations and communities; and be it 36 37 further
- Resolved, That we recognize, remember, and give thanks to God for the Care and 38 39 Comfort Committee that raised dollars to support the faculty and staff 40 members of Concordia College who were losing jobs due to the closure of 41 the school; and be it further
- 42 Resolved, That we give voice to our thanks and praise to God for working 43 through Concordia College, and pray His continued guidance, as we rise 44 and sing the Common Doxology; and be it finally
- Resolved, That we memorialize the 2023 Synod in convention to adopt the above 45 46 resolution.

- Whereas, in 1881 the Lutheran Church of St. Matthew in Manhattan established a school to prepare men to continue education at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis which later became Concordia College New York; and
- 9 **Whereas,** Concordia College New York served as an institution of higher education
- 11 for over 140 years; and
- 12 Whereas, Through the Concordia University System, countless women and men
- receive a quality, Christian education to be sent out to live their vocations in the name of Jesus; and
  - Whereas, Concordia College New York continues to have a significant impact on the church at large through the witness of the priesthood of believers who attended the college; and
  - Whereas, the Atlantic District is thankful to God for Concordia College New York and its contribution to the wider church and society; and
  - Whereas, With the closure of Concordia College New York, The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod does not have a center for higher and professional education on the East Coast of the United States; therefore let it be
  - Resolved, That the Atlantic District in Convention instructs the District President
- to work with other District Presidents in the East Coast Region and the
  Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod, in identifying opportunities for the
  establishment of a new center for higher and professional education,
  either physically or virtually, based in the East Coast Region.

Whereas, colleges and universities of the CUS provide "Christian higher education communities of learning where mutual respect flourishes, responsibility is developed and reverence for God is cultivated so that students can pursue lives of passion, purpose and service" (Mission Statement of Concordia College New York); and

Whereas, each of the colleges and universities within CUS is committed to the integration of curricula and academic subjects with the Gospel of Jesus Christ; and

- Whereas, the colleges and universities of the CUS have served thousands of people throughout the nation and around the world by giving them access to quality Christian education and rigorous opportunities to pursue studies in the liberal arts; and
- Whereas, thousands of people have been graduated from colleges and universities within the CUS including thousands of professional Church workers who have served throughout Christ's Holy Church all over the world as they have been provided quality theological education and vocational formation; and
- Whereas, the colleges and universities of the CUS have provided many people the opportunity to hear the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ as they are encouraged and directed in their vocations of service throughout the world, with many people being baptized and countless people being rerooted to the Christian faith; therefore be it
- Resolved, the colleges and universities of the CUS be commended for their God-pleasing work; and be it further
- Resolved, that Lutherans in their congregations promote the colleges and universities of the CUS and their programs and offerings, especially programs that train workers for the Church; and be it further
- Resolved, that Lutherans throughout The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod be encouraged to support the colleges and universities of CUS with their regular prayers, precious time, diverse talents, and generous financial resources; and be it further
- Resolved, that all who have benefitted in any way through the years from the colleges and universities of the CUS support them in any way possible; and be it finally
- Resolved, that both the LCMS Atlantic District and the entire LCMS take every available step and use every gift given to them by God to ensure that the colleges and universities of CUS continue to operate with their inspiring mission for generations to come to the glory and praise of Almighty God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Whereas, the use of doctrinally sound resources is part of the covenant in
which members of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod walk together,
according to Article III and Article V of the Constitution of the LCMS;

Whereas, the faith is communicated with words and images; therefore be it

Resolved, that the Atlantic District in convention petition the LCMS to publish religious education materials including, but not limited to, images and languages that better reflect and serve global diversity (cf. Revelation 7); and be it further

Resolved, that images from Bible stories, liturgical art, and images of our Lord Jesus Christ do not only include images of people of European descent, but better reflect global artistic traditions; and be it further

Resolved, that the publication arms of the LCMS consult directly with people of color who are called church workers from all geographical regions in the LCMS, as well as consulting directly with laypeople from all geographical regions in the LCMS to insure the resources are appropriate; and be it finally

Resolved, that progress on this front be reported to the Synod for the 2026 Regular Convention.

- Whereas, Racism remains an issue that is apparent in our society; and
- Whereas, Racism is a sin, as well as an obstacle to the work of the Church, it is incumbent upon us to examine our own human failings in view of the Word of God; and
- 9 Whereas, Dr. Martin Luther taught, and we confess, that the Fifth
  10 Commandment, "You shall not murder," means that we should fear and love
  11 God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbors, but help and defend
  12 them in every physical need, which we have failed to do; and
- 13 Whereas, We lament the silence of many Christians in the face of racism; and
  - Whereas, Racism is manifested in discrimination in jobs, housing, education past and present—and causes great suffering and harm to many people; and

  - Resolved, that we give thanks for the work that the LCMS has done addressing racism; and be it further
  - Resolved, that we, the Atlantic District in convention, likewise acknowledge our failures for not seeing racism and addressing it for what racism is in our church body and beyond, and repent of those failures; and be it further

  acknowledgment of our silence to racism that have hurt God's children;

Resolved, that in the development of these new resources the LCMS consult directly with people of color who are called church workers from all geographical regions in the LCMS, as well as consulting directly with laypeople from all geographical regions in the LCMS to insure the resources are appropriate and articulated; and be it further

**Resolved,** that we do everything possible so that as we in the LCMS are "making disciples for life," this church body will be known as a church body that welcomes people regardless of their ethnicity or culture in the Name of and by the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ; and be it finally

Resolved, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the LCMS for action at the 2023 LCMS convention.

# To Strengthen the Nonvoting Advisory Delegate Participation at Conventions

- Whereas, Currently, there are 12,010 Ministers of Religion Commissioned (Church Worker Update System March 2021) who serve the mission and ministry of congregations, schools, child development centers, camps, compassion centers, and mission work throughout the national and global mission fields; and
- 9 Whereas, The current structure of the Synod does not allow for a third 10 category of voting delegates at district and Synod conventions (Synod 11 Handbook: Article IX, Article 12 XII.10.b); and
- Whereas, The Synod highly values Ministers of Religion Commissioned for their eagerness to serve the Lord and His Church (2019 Resolution. 9-17, "To Study Voting Privilege in the LCMS" p.201 of 2019 LCMS Convention Proceedings); and
  - Whereas, Ministers of Religion Commissioned are considered Advisory Members with representation, voice, but no vote at conventions of districts and Synod, along with "those ordained ministers not eligible for election as a voting delegate" under Bylaw 3.1.2.1(d) ... (p,101 Handbook 2019) with representation, voice, but no vote at conventions of districts and Synod; and
  - Whereas, Some districts utilize the voice and guidance of their Ministers of Religion Commissioned in district conventions through a non-counted advisory member vote; and
  - Whereas, The Atlantic District has passed resolutions in previous conventions to study and garner the guidance of Ministers of Religion Commissioned, and
  - Whereas, This honors the bylaw and structure of the Convention while allowing the Nonvoting Advisory Delegate voice to be heard and their vote recognized; therefore, be it
  - Resolved, That the Atlantic District enable Nonvoting Advisory Delegates to provide a preliminary non-binding poll of resolutions, not elections, during its regular conventions, and be it further
- Resolved, That the results of the advisory poll be announced prior to the delegate vote; and be it further
- Resolved, That this become effective with the next District Convention in 2025, and be it finally

# To Promote Ministry to College and University Students among the Congregations of the Atlantic

- Whereas, a vital demographic in need of sustained ministry and spiritual care in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS) is comprised of college and university students (including undergraduate and graduate students); and
- Whereas, this demographic is most-susceptible to falling away from the faith without sustained pastoral care and a supportive church community; and
- Whereas, successful and effective campus ministry is often the product of a coordinated group-effort on the part of multiple congregations working together to ensure that the children of said congregations are connected to a supportive and nurturing church community at their university or college; and
- Whereas, LCMS campus ministries can be at a disadvantage in terms of funding, man-power, and communications; and
- Whereas, consistent synodical support for and promotion of campus ministries cannot be relied upon given constraints on funding and personnel; and
- Whereas, a robust campus ministry focus is necessary not only for the health of Synod but, more importantly, for the health and souls of young adults on our college and university campuses; and
- Whereas, The Atlantic District of the LCMS is in a unique position, by virtue of its size, to encourage mutual promotion of campus ministries among the congregations within its boundaries; Therefore, be it
- Resolved, that the Atlantic District encourage congregations and clergy in the Atlantic District to connect students with local congregations upon their leaving to attend higher education; and be it further
- Resolved, that the Atlantic District develop a directory of congregations either currently involved in campus ministry or in proximity to college and university campuses to better facilitate the sharing of resources between congregations that can serve campuses, as well as communication between pastors who are seeking to ensure proper pastoral care for students in their congregations; and be it further
- Resolved, that the Atlantic District take the lead in reaching out to other districts in the LCMS to encourage pastors there to reach out to Atlantic District congregations that their students may attend to better facilitate their pastoral care; and be it finally
- Resolved, that the District President of the Atlantic District would work
  with Task Force 4 Education to oversee and develop a set of resources
  in the carrying-out of these resolutions and report back to the next
  regular district convention.

#### To Encourage House Blessings

- Whereas, Holy Scripture speaks often of the divine blessing of house and home (viz. Psalm 104, Psalm 128, Luke 19, Luke 10), and
  - Whereas, Martin Luther's Small Catechism included devotions and prayers for use in the home, and
  - Whereas, the Lutheran Service Book and other Lutheran hymnals and agendas include liturgies for the blessing of a home for pastoral and congregational use, and
- Whereas, the blessing of a home provides opportunity for a ministry of congregational hospitality in mission for both member families and those requesting such blessing, Therefore, be it
- Resolved, that the Atlantic District in convention commend to its own congregations and pastors the ministry of house blessing, and be it further
- Resolved, that the President of the Atlantic District, through Task Force 2 Revitalization share resources and avenues to begin this ministry in
  the congregations and regions of the Atlantic District with resources
  in the next triennium, and be it finally
- Resolved, that these resources and this commendation be brought to the national assembly of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod at its convention for use and guidance.

#### To Promote Transparency of District Governance

- Whereas, The Board of Directors of the Atlantic District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod serve on behalf of the congregations of the district; and
- Whereas, The Atlantic District relies on the congregations for prayer, volunteers, and financial support; and
  - Whereas, Many congregations and ministers in the Atlantic District may be unaware of the actions of the Board of Directors; and
- Whereas, Many congregations and ministers in the Atlantic District may be unaware of the financial position, assets and liabilities, and activities of the district; and
- Whereas, Communication of the minutes of Board meetings and of audited financial statements are to be accessible to the congregations and ministers of the Atlantic District; therefore be it
- Resolved, The scheduled meetings of the Board of Directors, task forces, and other governance bodies of the Atlantic District continue to be posted on the district website; and be it further
- Resolved, That the Atlantic District through Task Force 6 Communications review the conveyance of information regarding: minutes of the Board of Directors, Task Forces, and other Governance Bodies; financial reports; audits; and the real and personal property held by the district; and be it further
- Resolved, That the Atlantic District in coordination with Task Force 6 Communications make recommendations and implement a new strategy in sharing said information in a timely way; and be it finally
- Resolved, that members of the Atlantic District, rostered churches, ordained and commissioned workers, be encouraged to request information as allowed by the LCMS Handbook, through the District President and participate in the ongoing work of ministry in the Atlantic District.
